## Protecting The Public

An important safety factor that is often overlooked is the safety of the general public. The general public is defined as anyone who may encounter a project work zone who isn't a worker or contractor on that project. This can be motorists driving through the barricade plan, or pedestrians walking past on foot. The few minutes each day spent to leave the jobsite in a safe condition is nothing compared to the cost, and bad public relations that could occur if someone was injured due to unsafe conditions found on the jobsite.

### Safety Tips

- Keep the job site fenced off to prevent easy access. It is even better if there is also a padlocked gate.
- Maintain any fences or barrier railing on a regular schedule .
- Place warning signs and safety reminders at all road entrances to the site. Make sure the entrances have adequate lighting.
- Ensure there is enough clearance around a jobsite to protect people from falling material.

### At the End of Each Work Day, Make Sure:

- » The boundary is secure and current work areas are barricaded or caution-taped.
- » All ladders are removed or their rungs boarded.
- » All excavations and openings are securely covered or fenced off.
- » All mobile equipment is immobilized to prevent unauthorized use.
- » Bricks and other materials are safely stacked.
- » Flammable or hazardous substances, tools, and other materials are locked away in secure storage locations.

### Develop a Communication Program

- Work with are schools and agencies to teach people about the your jobsite.
- Communicate to the public that your job site protects the health and safety of everyone, not just the workers.
- Maintain good community relationships. Building bridges can be a big help in protecting your jobsite, as well as protecting the public.
